

Neil McKeganey Ph.D. FRSA is a sociologist who has undertaken a wide range of studies in the area of substance use and misuse including research into the nature and extent of pre-teen drug use, the link between drugs and crime, the effectiveness of treatment services and the impact of parental drug use on children. In 1994 he founded the Centre for Drug Misuse Research at the University of Glasgow. In 2005, Neil McKeganey was invited to the U.S. White House to discuss the issue of teenage drug use. In 2002 he was awarded the Nils Bejerot prize for his contribution to international drug policy. Neil has worked in conjunction with a wide range of governments and international bodies including the WHO, UNODC, the U.S. Department of Justice. Neil is the author of six books and over 200 peer reviewed academic papers. As well as being a widely published academic Neil has written for the Guardian, Sunday Times, Times, Daily Mail, Independent, Daily Telegraph and contributed to a large number of television and radio programmes. Neil McKeganey's research was one of the contributing factors to the development of a recovery focus in UK drug treatment policy. In 2011 Neil formed the Centre for Substance Use Research as an independent research grouping undertaking research in the substance use field within the U.K., Europe and the United States. Neil is currently looking to develop research in a number of low and middle income countries in Asia.
